Canterbury House begins production in Carlisle

CARLISLE - Canterbury House began production of toddler girl's dresses as planned Monday, Dec. 4.

Dr. Pam Sparks Stein, a head dentist, co-owns the new dress-making venture with her mother, Carol Sparks, also of Carlisle.

Located at the corner of Locust and Market Streets in the building formerly known as Jewel Vice, once called the Ratliff Building, four employees began work with Stein and Sparks also manning a sewing machine when needed.

"We think it's going to be

wonderful. We want this to be worker-friendly. This is not a sweatshop," Carol Sparks described the newly decorated interior of the new gray with an English country design style.

Besides the main sewing room, there's a side sewing room, lounge, and front area with a spotlighted showcase soon to be filled with lovely children's dresses.

The dresses are of top quality, include a lining and often, a grow-tuck which allows the hem to be let for longer wear. Fabrics are also top quality, Stein added.

Three buyers have already been hired to go to dress stores throughout the United

JMHC physicians announce intent to cover emergency room

Beginning December 1st, three members of the Johnson Mathers Health Care, Inc. Medical Staff will provide complete overnight and weekend coverage of the JMHC Emergency Room.

Jose Lorenzo, M.D., Chuck M. Dahan, M.D., and Fara Kardan, M.D. have joined together to provide this service to Nicholas Countians.

The opportunity for permanent full time physician coverage of emergency services at JMHC arose following a decision by Dr. Dahan to pursue emergency medicine full time. He has already served the emergency room on some week-nights and weekends since his local medical practice began last year.

Dr. Lorenzo has been part of the regular rotation of emergency physicians at JMHC for several years, even before establishing a private office practice in Nicholas County.

Dr. Lorenzo and Dr. Dahan will cover the bulk of emergency room hours. Dr. Kardan will fill in the remaining time.

This change in schedule has allowed Johnson Mathers Health Care to discontinue its contract with National Emergency Services (NES), an organization that specializes in placing quality physicians in hospital emergency rooms.

"NES has been a great service because it eases the burden on local doctors through nights and weekends. The downside, however, is that though NES provides good doctors, they're not known in the community."

"So there is a benefit for our patients to have our doctors cover the emergency room for the time being, we are glad the doctors felt they could provide this service," Melanie Denton, Manager of JMHC Emergency Services, said.

FRANKFORT, Ky. - The December 12 inauguration of Governor-elect Paul Patton and Lt. Governor-elect Stephen Henry will be celebrated with a parade featuring about 150 floats, bands and other units from throughout the state, including locally, our very own Nicholas County High School Marching Band. Also from surrounding counties, The Harrison County High School Marching Band, Paris/Bourbon County High School Marching Band and The Millersburg Military Institute Color Guard.

Former Gov. Edward T. "Neil" Santee will serve as Grand Marshal for the 50th inaugural parade. The one-mile parade route starts in downtown Frankfort at Main Street and Wilkinson Boulevard and ends at the Capitol. The parade will begin at 10:00 a.m. with a one-gun salute by the Kentucky National Guard on the overlook above the Capitol. Weather permitting, the National Guard

also will perform aircraft flyovers during the two and one-half-hour parade.
