Fruit Candy

GET READY... Two pounds of dried fruit—apples, dates, raisins, figs or other; Juice and peel from one orange; One cup of coarsely chopped walnuts; One or two tablespoons of honey or corn syrup if desired; One 6-ounce package of chocolate pieces (optional); Cookie sheet, cookie cutters, double boiler, food processor, small bowl, strainer, waxed paper.

GET SET... Adult supervision is needed when using a food processor and double boiler; Remove peel from orange, then squeeze juice through a strainer into bowl.

GO! 1. Make the dough. Grind fruit and orange peel together. (Note: Try blending different fruits together for a unique taste! Don't grind mixture too finely. Stir in orange juice and nuts. Taste. If sweeter candy is desired, blend in honey or corn syrup.

2. Shape the candy. Cover the work area and cookie sheet with waxed paper. Shape candy into balls or bars, or flatten dough and cut out shapes. Place candy on cookie sheet covered with wax paper and let it stand for 24 hours.

3. Ice the candy (optional). Melt the chocolate in a double boiler. (Hint: If you don't have a double boiler, make one by placing a small pot into a larger pot.) Spread melted chocolate instead of dark chocolate, then add food coloring. Makes 24 bars or bolts.

Painted Desk Set

A little paint and lots of imagination turn empty containers into a colorful desk set.

- GET READY... Various sizes of containers: coffee cans, soup cans, cocoa containers, spice tins, tuna and sardine cans, potato chip cans, frozen dinner, microwaveable plates, small boxes and pet food containers; Acrylic paint: white, red, blue, green and yellow.



- GO! 1. Apply base coat. Paint all containers and plates, inside and out, with white. Let dry. Paint a second coat on outside of container if needed to cover printing. Let dry. 2. Add the designs. Pour a small amount of blue, red, yellow and green paint into separate bowls. Lightly moisten sponges with paint, making sure surface is completely covered. Gently press sponges onto containers. Repeat as desired, changing colors and shapes as you work around the containers. Be sure to reload sponges with paint between each application. Let dry. 3. Finish up. After paint has dried, paint rims of containers red. Let dry. Paint containers with a coat of high-gloss varnish. Let dry.

GET SET... Be sure to cover your work area with old newspapers or an old sheet.
