BROCCOLI AND RICE CASSEOLE
1 1/2 cups frozen chopped
1/2 cup chopped celery
1 package 10 oz. frozen
chopped mushrooms
1 1/2 cups rice
1 1/2 cups processed cheese spread
1 can condensed Cream of
Mushroom Soup
1 can evaporated milk
1 cup cooked rice
Cook rice before measuring
in a large skillet over medium
heat. Sauté onion, celery, and
broccoli until soft. Place in
a greased 8 inch square baking
dish. Pour cheese over the rice
and make uncovered for 30
minutes for 25-30 minutes or
until hot bubbly.
FLUKEY FRUIT SALLAD
2 cans, 20 oz. each crushed
pineapple drained
2 cup sugar
1 1/2 cups crushed flour
2 eggs lightly beaten
1/4 cup orange juice
1/2 cup raisins
1 tsp. vegetable oil
1 1/2 cups mandarin oranges
drained
2 bananas sliced
1 1/2 cups instant oatmeal
Drain pineapple reserving 1
cup in a flour pan. Set pine-
apple stirring constantly. Add
sugar, flour, eggs, orange juice,

boil stirring constantly. Bake for

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Nicholas County selected for emergency food and shelter
Nicholas County has been chosen to receive \$2,340,000 to supplement emergency food and shelter programs in the area.
The selection was made under a new National Board that is chaired by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and consists of representatives from the Salvation Army, American Red Cross, Council of Jewish Federations, Catholic Charities, U.S.A. National Council of Churches of Christ in the U.S.A., and United Way of America which will provide the administrative staff and function as a fiscal agent. The Board was charged to distribute funds appropriated by Congress to help expand the capacity of food and shelter programs in high-needs areas around the country.
A Local Board made up of the County Judge, Senior Citizens, Ministerial Association, Social Services, homeless, and Community Action Council will determine how the funds awarded to Nicholas County will be distributed among the emergency food and shelter programs run by local service organiza-
