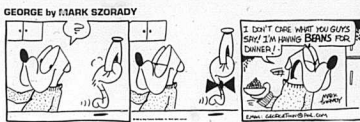

Q: It is normal for newborns to be startled by loud noises. A children are born into this world without fear. Shortly after, many of them pay a penalty because we, the parents, react and react to them. Few newborn babies seem to sense our fears. Some children may react to a startling reflex which is perfectly normal. Some children may react more to these others and will be within normal limits.

Having been protected for some months, the subconscious mind, it must be expected that sharp, clear memories of loud noises are a normal response.
