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ORDINANCE NO. 2, 1995

AN ORDINANCE ENACTING AND ADOPTING A SUPPLEMENT TO THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF CARLELE, KENTUCKY.

WHEREAS, American Legal Publishing Corporation of Cincinnati, Ohio has completed the Third Supplement to the Code of Ordinances of the City of Carlele, which supplement contains all ordinances of a general nature enacted since the prior supplement to the Code of Ordinances of this municipality; and

WHEREAS, said American Legal Publishing Corporation has recommended the revision or addition of certain sections of the Code of Ordinances which are based on or make references to sections of the Kentucky Code; and

WHEREAS, it is the intent of Council to accept these updated sections in accordance with the changes of the law of the Commonwealth of Kentucky;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT OBTAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CARLELE, COMMONWEALTH OF KENTUCKY:

SECTION 1. That the Third Supplement to the Code of Ordinances of the City of Carlele, Kentucky as submitted by American Legal Publishing Corporation of Cincinnati, and as attached hereto, and the same is hereby adopted by reference as if set out in its entirety.

SECTION 2. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its date of passage.
