In Nicholas County Democratic ticket takes general election

CARLISLE - The Democratic party clearly was the favorite of Nicholas County voters according to Tuesday night's General Election results.

Perhaps surprisingly, voter turnout was a little better than expected, too. Despite damp, gloomy weather and the need to complete tobacco stripping, 1,833 Nicholas County residents made it to the polls.

"We had 40 percent of registered voters turn out. That's pretty good," commented Nicholas County Clerk Doug Foyman at 6:50 p.m. Tuesday, following the vote count of 1,833 of all six precincts and absentee.

About a dozen Nicholas Countians awaited the voting results, but cleared the courthouse promptly after reading the recapitulation sheet.

"I'll think I'll go home and get some dinner," some of the men commented.

The only local race up for voting, the District 2 spot for Nicholas County Board of Education, went to Ricky Hicks with 202 total votes. Hicks has been the interim board member for the district. Candidate Charles Chuck Ring had 151 total votes with Marjion T. Williams with 21 votes.

No major problems were reported with local voting, but Foyman said the new computerized voting system failed early Tuesday morning at the engine house. The computer became operable within two hours.

Courthouse roof construction to begin Nov. 15

CARLISLE - Nicholas County Courthouse will get a new roof starting next week.

Thomas Snyder, owner of Orlentany Restorations told Nicholas County Judge Executive Chuck Smith on Friday, Nov. 3, his company would begin putting a new roof on the courthouse by Nov. 15. The project is expected to be complete in March 1996.

Smith was granted the go-ahead to talk with Snyder about the roof project by a unanimous vote of magistrates during a special called meeting Thursday, Nov. 2. With a motion by Magistrate Daryl Stary and a second by Magistrate Juanita Smith and all other magistrates

(Donny Hughes, Avery Thornburg and Melvin Foyman) in favor. Smith was given the court's approval to oversee the roof job.

"He wants to do the dome, too. We don't know about the money for that, yet, said the judge" Tuesday afternoon. However, the magistrates cleared the money for the roof itself with the Administrative Office of the Courts agreeing to pay 52.4 percent of the cost, a little more than \$40,000. A generous, anonymous Nicholas County donor contributed \$7,500 with the stipulation the court match it, which they agreed.

Judge Smith said he and Snyder viewed the roof via the attic before they had their nearly two hour meeting last Friday.
