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Band earns 2nd place in state

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Nine Carlisle businessmen attended the U.S. Chamber of Commerce workshop at the Phoenix Hotel Monday, sponsored by the Lexington Chamber of Commerce. They were among the 250 persons from 43 cities and towns in Kentucky, Ohio, Tennessee and Indiana.

Dwight Haven, Washington, D.C., manager of the Service Department of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce told the group that businessmen should take steps to overcome moral irresponsibility, and be distinguished with reality.

He cited the need for change in the "service" industry, pointing to the fact that school teachers who educate American children earn \$3,600 annually, while a baseball player can earn up to \$100,000 a year, and television comedians and motion picture personalities get fabulous incomes.

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
