1 cup nuts

Cream together butter and sugar. Add the eggs and stir. Add remaining ingredients and mix together. Drop onto greased cookie-sheet. Bake at 375° for 10-12 minutes. (The surprise is they taste much better than you might think!)

White sweatshirt
Dimensional fabric paint: green, yellow and red
2 star-shaped plastic cookie cutter
Pencil with new eraser
Plastic lid
Shirtboard

Option: Use waxed paper instead of a shirtboard to keep wet paint from seeping through to the back of the shirt.

Get Set...
Wash and dry sweatshirt—don't use fabric softener.
Insert shirtboard or waxed paper inside sweatshirt.

Go!
1 Tree. Squeeze green paint into plastic lid. Dip cutter into paint. Press yellow star directly beneath the center star in last row. Rinse lid.

2 Trunk. Squeeze yellow paint into plastic lid. Dip cutter into paint. Press yellow star directly beneath the center star in last row. Rinse lid.

3 Ornaments. Squeeze red paint into plastic lid. Dip eraser into paint. Gently touch eraser to shirt randomly around stars. Reload eraser with paint before each dot. Let dry.

4 Washing instructions. To wash, turn sweatshirt inside out. Hang dry.
