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Paris stuns Bluejackets

By Crystal Ring The Nicholas County Bluejackets found themselves stunned on Friday night, as they were flattened by the team from Paris Greyhounds 27-0. The game started out very well for the Bluejackets, who completely shut down the high-powered Paris offense in the first quarter. The Greyhounds found it difficult to move the ball against the tough, hard-hitting Bluejacket defense, who eventually caused Paris running back Vincent Clark to cough up the ball. Justin Massey recovered the fumble for the Jackets.

On their first possession the Bluejackets took the ball and found it relatively easy to move against Paris, but a fumble penalty for having an unbalanced chin strap cost the Bluejackets 5 yards and stalled their drive. "That was the type of thing you like to see hurt your team, Assistant Coach Jack Hayes said. The referees we had this year - this was the second time a foul of that nature occurred Friday - have only made the players better than themselves. They've never called a penalty on that, although they legally should have. It's a shame that it took us this week to just know."

Paris' defense just didn't allow the game with their heads down to a couple of statistics: Nicholas County was penalized for 10 plays for 60 yards. Paris produced 256 yards in total offense, but the Bluejackets gained only 126. "When you have a many yards in total offense, but only 241 to go in the first quarter, Jason, Oliver was called for a 15 yard unsportsmanlike conduct penalty for a late hit out of bounds. The fines were paid by the Greyhounds, but senior safety Roger Vance brought the team back with an interception of Maurice Garrard pass. The rest of the first half was much the same, with Nicholas County leading by 10-0 at the end of the first half. 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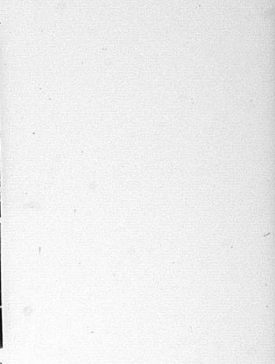
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
