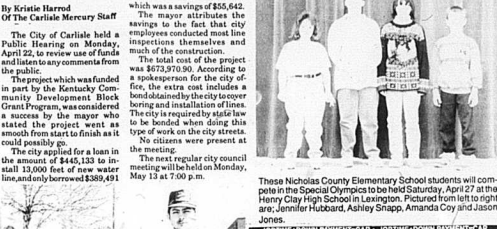
City holds Public Hearing

The City of Carlisle held a Public Hearing on Monday, April 22, to review an act of funding and to solicit comments from the public.

The project which was funded in part by the Kentucky Community Development Block Grant Program, was considered a success by the mayor who stated the project went as smooth from start to finish as it could possibly go.

The city applied for a loan in the amount of \$44,630 to install 13,000 feet of new water line and to borrow \$200,491
