Project Nursing Home on track

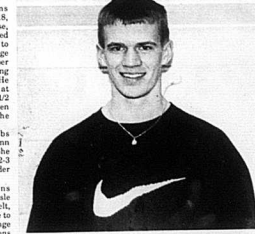
