The Nicholas County High School Boys Track Team were Runners Up in the Class A Region V Track Meet held at Kentucky State University on May 15 and 17. The boys scored 120 points, second only to Frankfort High School's 142 points.

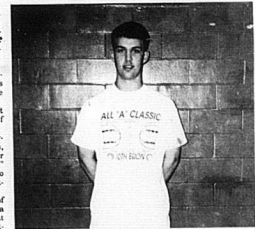
Sam Fulton is named Student of the Week
