History of PHYSICAL THERAPY

Establishment of the profession can be traced back to England late in the 18th century and to this country shortly after. The profession was brought to this country by Mary McMillan. Olympic sports and other sports were commonly known to possess of physical education by their official assistants and instructors in basic physical therapy techniques. This led to more advanced techniques to the health and welfare of polio victims patients during the severe epidemic of 1918.

In 1937 the Women's Auxiliary Aides was organized and was under the direction of Dr. George S. Parnell. The name was later changed to Recreational Aides and in 1981 was transferred to the Division of Physical Rehabilitation.

When the first PT course was organized at Walter Reed Hospital in Washington, D.C. the Surgeon General's Office had no staff of PT or staff. Since the need for PT to treat the war injured far exceeded the amount of therapists the school could supply, the need for more courses arose and additional institutions throughout the country established training courses. The graduates of these courses, "Recreational Aides" served in all Army hospitals and veterans hospitals as civilian employees subject to Army regulations. In addition to having to meet the requirements of the Surgeon General's Office, they were required to take exam and serve until they were released.
