NICHOLAS COUNTY BOARD OF EDUCATION PUBLIC NOTICE LOCAL BOARD PUBLIC HEARING

The Nicholas County Board of Education has scheduled a local public hearing on the proposed District Facility Plan for Tuesday, November 12, 1996, at the Nicholas County Elementary School Cafeteria at 7:00 PM. The District Facility Plan lists the pending capital construction and/or renovation projects that the school district may undertake, and the priority order that projects will be initiated. Copies of the proposed District Facility Plan are available for examination by interested individuals at the Board Office at 105 West Main Street, Carlisle, Kentucky, between 8:00 AM and 4:00 PM through November 12, 1996.

Comments should be directed to Randy Ewing, Superintendent, at 260-2775. Those individuals who would like to comment on the proposed District Facility Plan may present oral or written comments at the local Board public hearing. The local Board of Education, after due process, will forward the approved District Facility Plan to the Kentucky Department of Education for ultimate approval by the State Board of Education.

The local Board public hearing is being scheduled in accordance with KRS 157.620 and regulated by 702 KAR 1.001.

Deer hunters help economy

Over 200,000 people are preparing for the deer hunting season in Kentucky. These hunters add more than \$75 million annually to the Bluegrass state's economy according to figures from the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources.

John Phillips, KDFWR's Deer Program Coordinator, expects an increase in harvest this year. "We seem to have had good reproduction and survival, which means more deer will be available during the season."

Kentucky's modern gun deer season is set for November 9-15 in most counties. Even though the herd size is growing in Eastern Kentucky, and most of the harvest increase will come from that area, some southeastern counties still have only five-day modern gun seasons (Nov. 9-13) due to lower herd size.

Hunters are required to have permission from landowners before entering private lands. Hunters participating in any season must wear hunter orange clothing on the head, chest and back. The deer season limit is one deer per hunter, only one of which may be antlered. Hunters should review regulations for the county they plan to hunt to learn when and if antlered deer hunting is permitted.

Archery deer season will continue statewide through Jan. 15, 1997.

Crossbow season will run Nov. 26 through Dec. 3. The final segment of muzzle loading season is Dec. 18-20.

Assumptions. Interesting word, isn't it? We hear a lot about assumptions these days, mostly in a negative context. The Bible doesn't have to be that way. Assumptions determine how we go about doing things. They are part of the foundation upon which our actions are built. They remind us of what we are called to do as God's people. They help us to focus our efforts and make life more rewarding. One positive assumption is that young people are capable of becoming worthy citizens of our community as well as becoming models of a Christian lifestyle. This is the assumption of our church leaders, school teachers, and community leaders. The business of helping this generation become a reality. Many of our youth are involved in working to help the leaders and honorable citizens of our community today! Through the efforts of our encouraging participation in sports, school activities, community work, and church attendance, many of our youth are becoming what God intended them to be: active and helpful members of the society in which we live. Most of the efforts fall on their parents, grandparents, pastors, teachers, and local police. And that is exactly where nurturing should come from. However, there are also many in this community that do not have the responsibility of nurturing and teaching, and this leaves us with youth who have no guidance, no limits, and no joy.
