Systemwide response applies for JUMP grant

Expanding alcohol and drug education efforts in schools and developing a youth mentor program were tackled by Nicholas County Systemwide Response at its Aug. 28 meeting.

Systemwide Response also wants to create a youth mentor program for young offenders and parents with a support group similar to Alcoholics Anonymous.

CSH was formed to target the problems of drug and alcohol abuse by youth in Nicholas County and offer resolutions and alternatives to substance abuse.

The meeting began with Dr. Wendell Kingsolver discussing a success story of a drug and alcohol program in Franklin County.

The program Kingsolver explained in a court ordered detox program. The only downfall to this program is

it doesn't involve parents. This program was explained to Kingsolver by Dr. Robert Blair, a Frankfort Pediatrician.

Nicholas County Youth Extension Agent, John Mark-Hack introduced Mark Handley of the Community Action Council. Handley described a federal grant which is available from the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention.

The grant is called Juvenile Mentor Program or JUMP and offers funding for youth mentors affiliated with local schools and public or non-profit organizations.

The application for the JUMP grant is due by September 30. According to Hack there is no guarantee that Nicholas County will receive the grant. Handley and Hack stated that they will work creatively to apply for the federal grant.

Sharpsburg waterline nearly complete

The Sharpsburg Water District's Phase 2 extension project which began with construction by Kenney, Inc. of Mt. Sterling in February of 1995 is nearly 95% complete according to Paul Amburg, Engineer with Woolpert Consultants.

The Phase 2 extensions project should be completed in approximately 2 weeks and will provide about 25 miles of new waterlines in Bath and Nicholas

Counties as follows:

1. East Union, Lower Sharpsburg Road, Conestoga Road area
2. Route 57 and Route 1285 area
3. Watkins Lane
4. John Dams Road

Bath County
1. Burdridge Branch
2. Sanderson Road

3. Oakley/Public Road (Route 1602)

4. East Fork (Route 1325), Route 11, Ledford Road area

5. Springfield Road

Anyone interested in getting water service along these areas that have not paid their tap fee should call the Water Office in Sharpsburg at 247-2861 (Bath County) or 1-800-259-2861. The tap fee is \$400.

Board accepts door/window bids; LPC discussion

The Nicholas County Board of Education met Wednesday, August 28 at the Central Office to discuss bids for exterior door and window replacement for the Nicholas County High School building.

The board accepted bids from Blue Grass Door & Glass for \$65,000. A bid from Central Kentucky Glass was also considered. The estimated cost for the project was \$90,000 to \$95,000 according to Ron E.

Murrell, of Ross-Tarrant Architects, INC., of Lexington.

The sale of bonds to fund the project is set for September 10 in Frankfort. Immediately following the meeting for bids and bonds the board and Local Planning Committee met unofficially to discuss the recommendation of a new separate high school plan given to the board by the LPC. In a heated discussion the LPC and board tried to come to terms

and revise the plan written by the LPC. After many hours of deliberation the hopes for a revision of the plan were unsuccessful.

The LPC plans to meet Tuesday, September 3, and the Board of Education plans to meet separately on Wednesday, September 4. A plan is expected to go before the Kentucky Department of Education before the October 1, 1996 deadline.
