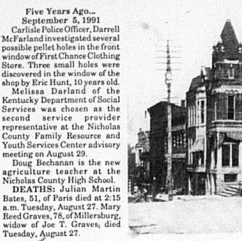

WIC program helps many
FRANKFORT, Kentucky - Women, Infants and Children (WIC) program for food and other services do not have to be unemployed or on welfare to receive benefits.

Martin Miller, nutrition services manager in the state Department for Health Services, says even a family with a monthly income of \$2,405 may qualify.

WIC is a supplemental nutrition program for women who are pregnant, postpartum or breastfeeding infants and children under five years old.

Health Services Commissioner Eric Lamb, M.D., said "I urge all Kentuckians who are entitled to the benefits of the WIC program to use it. Meeting the nutritional needs of Kentucky children today will most a healthier Kentucky in the future."

WIC clients receive nutritional foods such as infant formula, milk, cereal, juice, peanut butter, cheese, raw carrots, tuna fish, dried beans and eggs, as well as nutritional information. "Proper nutrition combined with other appropriate health services helps maintain and promote normal growth and development," said Miller.

"Proper nutrition is vital for both the physical and intellectual development of children, especially during pregnancy and during their early years."

Studies show that many serious health problems can be prevented with proper nutrition and both financial and physical costs can be avoided through early care.

A recent Kentucky health indicators report from 1982 to 1993 because of the WIC program. The number of children with anemia dropped from 2.2 percent to 1.7 percent, the number of underweight children decreased from 3.6 percent to 2.4 percent, and the number of low birth weight babies fell from 11.4 percent to 8.8 percent, Miller said.

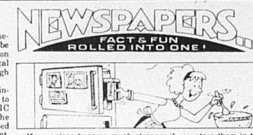
National studies of the WIC program have shown that WIC significantly increased the head size of infants whose mothers participated in WIC had fewer premature births, and sought prenatal care in pregnancy.

The program is open to all persons and does not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin, age, sex or disability.

To find out if you or your children are eligible for WIC, contact your local health department for more information.
