The Nicholas County Board of Education met Monday night, September 16 at the Central Office for their regular meeting.

With all members present the board discussed issues concerning the plan for updating and renovating the high school and student/teacher ratios.

The discussion of the new plans for the high school to become a seventh through twelfth grade facility got underway with an acceptance of a letter from the Local Planning Commission.

City officials attend 67th Annual KLC Convention

LOUISVILLE, Ky. - Downstream revitalization, public safety, economic development and leadership skills were among the topics discussed during the 67th Annual Kentucky League of Cities Convention held at the Galt House West in Louisville, September 12 through 14. The convention attracted nearly 1,100 Kentucky municipal officials and employees. State government officials and members of the judiciary were among the panelists participating throughout the three-day conference.

Founded in 1927, the Kentucky League of Cities is a membership organization of 347 cities across the Commonwealth, including Carlisle. A staff of 40, headquartered in Lexington, provides services in a host of areas.

Gov. Paul Patton officially opened the Exhibit Hall at the convention on Thursday, September 12. Mayor Gregory S. Lauback of Columbus, Ohio, president of the National League of Cities, addressed convention delegates during the opening session on Friday morning, September 13. Lauback is the chief spokesman of the exhibit.

Funeral services were held Tuesday, September 17, at Mathers-Gaunce Funeral Home for the infant son of Amy Cook and David Gates.

Twenty-two month old Bradley Kyle Gates was found dead at his home on Lake Road early Saturday morning.

The child's mother discovered him a short time after 8:00 a.m. A call was then made to 911 by a neighbor at approximately 8:20 a.m. According to a family member, a friend of Cook immediately began cardiopulmonary resuscitation on the six-month infant.

According to a family member, the preliminary autopsy report showed the infant had a tumor at his Adrenal gland which caused a massive heart attack.
