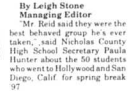

"He said it'd take all his property. He just said he'd move."

Jim Summers, an industrial arts teacher at Nicholas County High School, who is also on the official Glen Stevens and Barbara Walters design firm, said he could tell from the map, the design will affect part of the area in which he hoped to provide more lines to more customers. But, it obviously deters the project.

TWO PLANS

Two plans were shown on the huge map. Alternite A & B are both considered to "serve the local public." They both lie near Stoney Creek Bridge to the head of the project near KY 124 (new section just south of Blue Licks). The approximately 2.8 miles between KY 1455 and Stoney Creek Bridge, on both Alternite A & B are located on opposite sides of the remaining U.S. 68.
