Magistrates discuss Dayton/Hensley Road - again

 The Dayton Farm/Tom Hensley road dispute was argued at Tuesday's regular meeting of Nicholas County Fiscal Court.

Leslie Mitchell, who lives at the end of the road, talked to magistrates. "I asked them if they would turn it into a county road," Mitchell said while the magistrates were executive session for a personal discussion.

Mitchell said he talked to Hensley, Norman Dempsey, Billy Darr, Bonnie Wilson and his son, Walter Mitchell, all residents, and they would sign a paper asking it to be talk with Elmo Bowry.

A Nicholas County Circuit Court Order had earlier stated the county would pay for rock on the road but the residents would split the haul fee, which is in the neighborhood of \$100, for every 100 feet. Mitchell said he asked the magistrates to make the payment more equitable, split five ways - four by the county and one by Mitchell, which makes him pay half the haul fee for his residents on the other side of the road split the haul fee four ways.
