Dairy farmers can increase income by milking more cows, but should consider several factors before expanding their herds.

Each cow added to a herd can return \$400-600 a year, but also costs \$1,000-1,500 for feed, labor and other expenses.

High feed prices and scarce supplies of high quality hay make it difficult to increase production per cow by improving the feeding program.
