An important new medical service in the detection and treatment of osteoporosis is now available at the Radiology department of the Nicholas County Hospital—Bone densitometry. Osteoporosis is a major threat to public health. It is a condition found most commonly in women, but it is not uncommon in men. Osteoporosis is caused by a loss in bone mass. It is known as "the silent thief" because it progresses without any visible symptoms or pain. For the unfortunate sufferer, the disease is detected when bones, suddenly, and easily, break. Hip breaks, wrist breaks, and fractures of the spine are common in those suffering osteoporosis and these breaks may be painful.
