Additional funding is available for higher education in Kentucky

An additional \$11 million has been appropriated for state aid to help financially needy Kentucky students put their higher education expenses. Students who plan to attend a college or technical school this fall still have time to apply by completing the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). FAFSAs are available from financial aid officers at participating postsecondary schools, high school counselor offices, or the Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority (KHEAA). Due to insufficient funds, thousands of Kentuckians who qualified for need-based state aid did not receive awards in years past.

In response to this continuing lack of funding for deserving students, Governor Paul E. Patton included additional funding in his executive branch budget proposal. The 1998 Kentucky General Assembly subsequently approved the appropriation of funds for the 1998-99 College Access Program (CAP) Grants, Kentucky Tuition Grants, and Teacher Scholarships.

Students who have already applied for CAP and Kentucky Tuition Grants will begin receiving notification from KHEAA regarding their eligibility.

KHEAA will continue mailing award letters as new applications data is received for students who qualify for one or both programs.

KHEAA will also notify students who did not meet eligibility requirements or did not provide sufficient information to determine their eligibility. Students are urged to carefully review data contained in the notification and respond immediately to requested information.

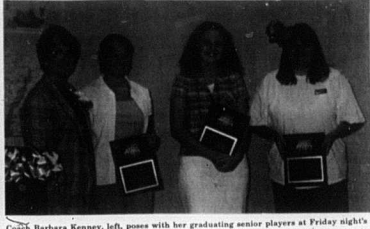
Students who do not plan to attend the institution listed on the grant award letter should advise KHEAA as soon as possible by writing KHEAA Grant Programs, 1600 E. 127 South, Frankfort, KY 40601-4703.

KHEAA must receive the written notice of actual change no later than August 1, 1998, or the fall semester on December 1, 1998, for the Spring semester.

CAP Grants may be used at public, private or public or private college or university, proprietary school or publicly operated technical school.

The award amount for college students is equal to the community college tuition rate,

which for 1998-99 is \$530 each semester for full-time attendance and \$44 each credit hour for half-time attendance. Students attending a proprietary or technical school with tuition rate at publicly operated technical schools, which for 1998-99 is \$320 each semester for full-time, \$210 for three-quarter time, and \$220 for half-time attendance. Kentucky Tuition Grants may be used at an eligible Kentucky private college. The maximum award for a full-time student for 1998-99 is \$1,500. To apply for a Teacher Scholarship, students must complete a Teacher Scholarship application as well as the FAFSA. The deadline for receiving the FAFSA data from the central processor and the Teacher Scholarship application is May 2. Teacher Scholarship applicants are available from high school counselors, KHEAA, or college education officers. If the teaching service obligation is not met, the scholarship converts to a loan which must be repaid with interest. Nicholas County budgeted for new health department

Nicholas County fired well in the state legislative budget approved during the 1998 session of the Kentucky General Assembly.

Sen. Danny Nunnally, D-Midway, worked throughout the 60-day session to address major issues ranging from using lottery proceeds for college scholarships to stabilizing the health insurance market to toughening sentences for violent offenders.

Additionally, the legislature negotiated a \$29.3 billion dollar budget for the state, which includes general fund dollars, federal funds, the road fund and bonding. The two-year budget has been signed by Gov. Paul E. Patton.

Projects in the legislative budget for Nicholas County include a \$400,000 for new county health department construction.

\$12 million for major widening of U.S. 48 from Kentucky Highway 22 northwest of Carlisle to Kentucky Highway 1214.

"These projects will bring improvements that will benefit Nicholas County for generations to come," Nunnally said. "We worked hard throughout the session to ensure our Scholarship application is May 2. Teacher Scholarship applicants are available from high school counselors, KHEAA, or college education officers.
