## Financial aid available for tech college students

With spring registration parties fast approaching, time for students interested in attending Kentucky's community and technical colleges is at hand.

The good news is that virtually all students at the Kentucky Community and Technical College System are eligible for some type of scholarship, loan, grant or fee waiver.

The federal financial aid form for each branch — the 15 technical colleges and the 13 community colleges — is exactly the same. Issued by the U.S. Department of Education Student Assistance Program, the form is used by all students who enroll in a four-year college, professional school, or two-year community or technical college.

Financial aid comes in a variety of forms, such as a Pell Grant of the Federal

Despite a recent trend to increase speed limits on the nation's roadways, the Kentucky State Police oppose such measures, because of the potential hazards to motorists on the state's highways.

The Kentucky State Police strongly oppose any increase in the state's maximum speed limit of 65 mph.

To date, 819 people have been killed on Kentucky's roadways in 1988. That's up six from the same period last year. Sixteen of those deaths were caused by speeding.

Even though several states recently raised their speed limits to 70 miles per hour, the Kentucky State Police don't feel that such an increase is in the best interest of travelers.

Commissioner Gary Rose said he hopes that the higher the speeds involved in a crash, the higher the risk of fatalities, and the KSP cannot support an increase in the speed limits on the state's roadways.

Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant (SEOG), in money that students do not have to pay back.

A federal loan, such as the Perkins Loan, in money that students do not have to pay back.

Federal Work-Study (FWS) is money that students earn in a work setting and do not pay back.

In addition, students may be eligible for Title VII and Public Health Act Programs.

To be eligible for federal financial aid, a student must be a U.S. citizen or eligible non-citizen, be registered with Selective Service (if required), attend a college that participates in the program listed, work toward a degree, diploma or certificate, make satisfactory academic progress, not owe a refund on a federal grant or be in default on a federal educational loan; and demonstrate financial need.

Individual colleges offer a variety of student scholarships — money that does not have to be paid back. To determine the type of financial aid that best serves individual needs, a student should contact the Financial Aid Office and/or Admissions Office at the institution he or she plans to attend.

Scholarship and financial aid forms can be found there. Students also may be eligible for the Hope Scholarship, a refund of postsecondary education tax credit for the first two years of postsecondary education. Add a new program in Kentucky — the Kentucky Educational Excellence Scholarship — allows students to earn higher scholarships if they make good grades in high school and/or college at certain levels on the ACT.

## American Red Cross serves in war and peace

During the past summer and fall, the lowest County Chapter of the American Red Cross has been busy providing emergency assistance to persons involved in disasters, in helping the military, and in providing Health and Safety classes.

Steve Young works with emergency disaster and relief efforts. Most directly involved with helping people in disaster areas, such as flood, tornado or fire. The Red Cross provides help if people don't have a place to live because of their homes burning down, being flooded, or destroyed by a tornado.

At the end of June, there was some flooding in Eastern Kentucky, particularly in Elliott County. The Red Cross evaluated the area to see if there were any families whose homes were damaged by the flood. Steve Young and the Red Cross found shelter for families whose homes were damaged.

Services to the military include situations where military personnel need to return home. For instance, a soldier in Korea had a death in his family and the Red Cross helped by making arrangements for his trip home.

The Red Cross has also been known to help families find apartments to live in, to help family members get to the reading of a will, and to help locate lost family members. Out of all the disasters that have happened during the past summer and fall were mostly fires, family homes burning down.

Jackie Lockwood, the director of Health and Safety for the Red Cross Rowan County Chapter. Some of the classes that are being taught this fall are first aid, CPR for the infant and child, basic aid, training, and swimming classes.

During the spring semester, these same classes will be taught.
