Fall gun turkey season is Dec. 2-6

They aren't necessarily the most attractive or graceful birds, but wild turkeys have quite a following in Kentucky. In fact, thousands of hunters will soon take to the woods to hunt these birds during the state's first fall gun season.

Expanding hunting opportunity, this new season runs Dec. 2 to 6 in 42 counties across Kentucky.

When modern turkey stocking began in 1976, Kentucky's turkey population was practically nonexistent. Following a successful restoration program, Kentucky's population is growing across the state. In fact, the number of turkeys in the state is now estimated to be 120,000 wild turkeys, the state can now support the additional hunting opportunity.

George Wright, KDFW's Turkey Program Coordinator, has estimated that less than 6 percent of the state's turkey population will be harvested during the fall gun season. Most of the turkeys from the fall gun season will likely be comprised of young birds, meaning most of the adult turkey population will survive.

Those that exceed the winter will reproduce next spring. In the wild, hen turkeys face a 40 to 60 percent annual mortality rate. Therefore, many of the adult birds harvested during the fall season would not survive the winter.

The early December hunt dates were selected to avoid hunting to early in September and October when the weather will be small, and also to avoid conflicting with youth big game deer hunting weekends.

During the five-day fall gun season, hunters must possess only shotgun no larger than 20 gauge and no smaller than 20 gauge. Only No. 4 shot and smaller is permitted. Shotgun pellets are not permitted. Hunters are not permitted to hunt more than three acres. The bag limit is one fall gun turkey per season in one hunting area.

In addition to a Kentucky hunting license, all fall gun hunters, except landowners, tenants and those with a valid landowner's permit, must possess a valid landowner's permit (\$10) and carry it with them during the hunt.

All turkeys harvested in Kentucky must be checked in by the nearest open check station or by the nearest open check station. The department of Fish and Wildlife will have fall gun turkey check stations on the day after the hunt and turkey must be checked in by 9 a.m. on the day after the hunt.

Landowners, tenants and their dependents hunting on their own land must tag a turkey assessed from their property. To do this, they should write their name, address, the date when and the county where the bird was taken on a card and attach the card to the turkey.

The fall gun turkey season was a wild turkey for Christmas dinner. It also provides an opportunity to hunt this elusive and hard to raise bird under the most challenging circumstances.

Those encountered in the spring. Although this is the first year for the hunt, officials with the KY Dept. of Fish and Wildlife are extremely popular among hunters. Roy Grimes, director of the department's Wildlife Division, said, "We're proud to be able to offer this opportunity to Kentucky hunters. Turkey populations are flourishing and we should have an abundance of birds this fall!"
