Pork quality assurance meetings set

Several slaughter facilities routinely used by Kentucky pork producers will require producers to be pork quality assurance level III verified by January of 1999. These new requirements are in response to the Department of Agriculture tightening up on quality controls in the meat packing industry.

In become a level III operation, producers are required to implement several "good production practices" related to food safety, according to Richard Caffee, Extension swine specialist with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

"These practices are part of a process to help prevent food safety problems, rather than reacting to them after they occur," he said.

Caffee and Gary Parker, UK Extension swine specialist, will be presenting nine training sessions throughout the state for producers to become familiar with steps they need to take to become verified at level III. Producers who attend any of the meetings will be verified level III for pork quality assurance.

The dates, sites and times for the training sessions are Oct. 28, 7 p.m., Bourbon County Extension Office; Oct. 27, 1 p.m., Nelson County Extension Office; Oct. 27, 7 p.m., Hardin County Extension Office; Oct. 28, 10 a.m., Rough River Lodge

(Grayson County); Oct. 28, 7 p.m., McLean County Extension Office; Oct. 29, 10 a.m., Logan County Extension Office; Oct. 29, 7 p.m., Union County Extension Office; Oct. 29, 7 p.m., Union County Extension Office; Oct. 29, 7 p.m., Green County Extension Office.

Each training session will last about two hours and will cover the fundamental principles of safe production practices necessary for verification.

Kentucky wood expo featuring training, educational and other wood products will be held at the Kentucky Wood Expo Sept. 18-20 at the Laurel Center Fairgrounds in London. Expo attendees will focus on wood industry activities from the time the tree is selected for harvest until it is converted into various stages of lumber and other wood products for finishing, educational and other uses.

Hours are 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Sept. 18 and 19 and 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Sept. 20. Admission is \$5 to \$9 at the gate, and \$3 for children age six to 12. Admission is free for children under age six.

"We believe this expo will have something to interest and entertain people in most every aspect of the timber industry — woodland owners, foresters, loggers and sawmill owners and employees," said Matthew Smith,

Extension forest harvesting specialist with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

"Rabbits and demonstration equipment will be on hand for management and processing equipment and high-tech technology and advancements in the wood industry," added Smith, who is stationed at the Robinson Center.

The educational exhibits are another valuable source of information for people in the timber industry.

Expo visitors also can take part in a "Log a Load for Kids" silent auction during the three-day event, according to Tim Quarry, forestry program coordinator. The silent auction is a part of the Children's Mixed Network, a non-profit organization.

The silent auction helps raise donations for sick and injured children in Kentucky and benefits the UK Children's Hospital, Quarry said.

Eagles defeat Austin Peay 44-21

Sophomore quarterback David Dinkins, who was making his first collegiate start, threw for three touchdowns and passed for another to lead Morehead State to a 44-21 season-opening victory at Austin Peay last Thursday.

Senior wide receiver Todd Chase caught six passes for 107 yards. Freshman halfback Cam Dinkal rushed for 66 yards on five carries and scored a touchdown. Freshman fullback Nicholas Woodbridge gained 52 yards on eight carries and also scored.

The Eagles never trailed in the contest, taking the opening kickoff and marching 74 yards on four plays in 1:56 with Dinkins scoring the first of his three touchdowns from 38 yards out. Dinkal scored on a 22-yard run to cap a 14-play, 96-yard drive late in the first quarter to

give MSU a 14-0 lead. After Austin Peay had cut the lead to 14-7 early in the second quarter, Dinkins scored a rushing touchdown and passed 44 yards for freshman halfback Matt Shagart to stretch the lead to 28-7.

Todd Dinkal kicked a 31-yard field goal and Woodbridge scored on a one-yard run for the Eagles on a two-play drive. Matt Ballard emptied his bench early in the second half, playing nearly every player that made the trip to the Clarksville, Tenn., school.
