Your vote counts in May... Voter Registration deadline is April 26

The deadline to register to vote in the upcoming May primary is Monday, April 26. County clerk's offices throughout Kentucky will accept voter registration cards until close of business that day. You can also register at the same time that you renew your driver's license.

Also, minors who are 17 years old but who will be 18 years old on or before the day of the general election (Nov. 2, 1999) are eligible to register

and entitled to vote in the primary.
If you haven't already done so, I encourage you to register today and exercise your constitutional right to vote on May 25," said John Y. Brown III, Kentucky's secretary of state and chief election officer.

Head Start accepting applications

Community Action Council for Lexington, Fayette, Bourbon, Harrison, and Nicholas Counties is now accepting applications for next fall's Head Start. Head Start is a federally funded child development program that prepares over 600 three and four year olds in low income families to be successful in school each year. Head Start is offered at ten sites in Fayette County, six sites in Harrison, two in Scott and one

in Nicholas. Full day full year child care is available. Applications are accepted Monday through Friday from 9:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., with appointments available after 4:00 p.m., at the following locations:
• 913 Georgetown Street, Lexington
• 135 Scroggin Park, Georgetown
• Community Service Center of Harrison County, 217 Old Lair Road, Cynthia.

To be eligible for Head Start, a child must be three or four years old before October 1, 1999. Applicants must have the following for each child:
1. Official birth certificate,
2. Income verification (pay stubs, letter from employer, etc.),
3. Social Security cards for everyone in household,
4. Immunization certificate, including the Hib vaccine.

5. Copy of the child's physical exam (completed within the last six months) and a copy of a current dental screening exam. The child's medical record must also be presented if receiving public assistance.

For more information, call (606) 259-7172. Community Action Council is a non-profit organization, operates Head Start in Fayette, Scott, Harrison and Nicholas Counties. The Council's mission is to combat poverty in these communities.

The future of Johnson-Mathers Health Care... Nicholas County Elementary

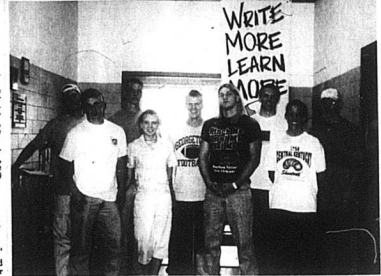
