Tommy continued from Front

A temple from Carlisle to Forest Retiree was chartered in 1845 - a distance of about three miles. About \$9,000 was subscribed by citizens, and in 1846 the work was begun. It was completed in 1848.

From 1856 to 1860 was a period of extraordinary prosperity. In three years of 1857-1859, one dry goods and grocery firm cleared \$6,000 each.

No manufacturing until 1948

It was always the misfortune of Carlisle, until 1948, that no manufacturing was added to anything they were ever established since the burning of the hemp factory in 1832.

Blue Grass Industries, then Griffin Manufacturing was established here in Carlisle in 1948. Other factories have since been established here.

Until 1880, Carlisle was a village of Carlisle was vested in a board of trustees. Then, the village form was changed, and the city was laid off into three wards - called the east and west wards and the middle ward with three councilmen.

Charles W. Munger was the first Mayor elected. Presently, six councilmen-at-large are elected for two-year terms.

Carlisle is thriving today

The population of the city, at the 1990 census was 1800. However, the city is much larger than the 2000 census coming up.

Downtown Carlisle has improved considerably over the past years. The downtown area adds much to the prosperity and beauty of the Little Town with the Big Heart.

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SAWELL NEWS NEWS OF SAFETY. Buses Are Still The Safest Way To Go. (NAPS) - As you may figure it, traveling by bus may be the safest way to go. You can look it up. According to the National Safety Council, in 1997 passenger cars were involved in nearly 67 percent of all vehicular accidents and almost 60 percent of all vehicular accidents that resulted in a fatality. Motorcycles killed at 3.8 percent of all vehicular accidents that year despite accounting for only 1.8 percent of all vehicle registrations. However, intercity heavy motorcoaches and buses used for trips and tours - accounted for well under one percent of all fatal accidents - less than 3 percent - and less than 2 percent of any kind of vehicular accident that year. The same trend holds true when measured against the safety of bus travel as measured against the air as well as passenger cars. In 1998, the National Safety Council compared figures collected by several different agencies and found that in 1998, interstate buses carried 360 million passengers, with two million fatalities. Railroads carried a similar number of passengers - 363 million - over fewer passenger miles - 15.4 billion miles compared to 130.2 billion for buses. Yet passenger trains were involved in 12 passenger deaths. Domestic airlines were involved in 329 fatalities that same year.
