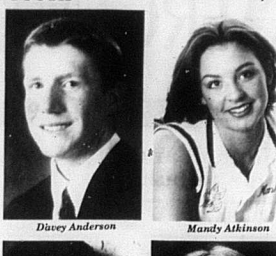
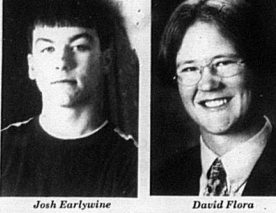

Fire Marshal warns of danger of illegal fireworks
As you make plans for your Fourth of July festivities, Governor Patton's Office has issued a Fire Marshal's Office statement to enjoy the holiday, but leave the fireworks demonstrations to the professionals.
Nationally, several thousand Americans are injured every year from fireworks-related accidents. Most involve children or adolescents and many are the result of careless acts or practices.
Last year, nine Kentuckians were injured by fireworks. In many cases, the user did not recognize the fireworks' defects, such as a short fuse, or torn or lacerated container. Other injuries were caused when fireworks were not lighted or when the person lighting the fireworks had been consuming alcohol.
State Fire Marshal Dave Manley warns that all Class "C" fireworks cannot legally be sold or offered for sale in Kentucky. "Not only are these fireworks scheduled to be recalled, but they are dangerous and offer entertainment, better and safer entertainment, and prevent you or one of your children from starting a fire or injuring themselves or someone else."

Rev. H. Dallas Sugg, 67, pastor emeritus of Highland Park Baptist Church, died June 29, 1999 at the University of Evansville, Ind. He was the son of the late Henry Dallas Sugg Sr. and Mattie Overton Sugg. He was a graduate of Barrett High School in Henderson, received his B.A. degree from the University of Evansville, Ind. He was a member of the Kentucky Wesleyan University in Owensboro, Ky., and attended Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in Louisville, Ky.
Rev. Sugg was a pastor for 37 years, serving churches in Kentucky prior to coming to Columbia in 1977 when he accepted the pastorate of Highland Park Baptist Church where he retired in 1987. He served on the Executive Board of both the Kentucky and Tennessee Baptist Conventions and was a past president of the Kentucky Baptist Association. He has been active in several community service organizations including the Carlisle Rotary Club and the Columbia Kiwanis Club as well as serving on numerous boards and committees.
He was preceded in death by his sister, Mary Mares.
He is survived by his wife, Marvne King Sugg, two daughters
