Summer Games challenges people to "come out and play"

Nearly 14,000 amateur athletes from around the state have already accepted the challenge to "Come Out and Play" during this month's Bluegrass Summer Games. As of early this week, 13,936 people from 104 counties in Kentucky have registered to participate in the Games, which will be held July 16-18 and July 23-25 in Lexington and surrounding counties. Opening ceremonies will be held from 4-9 p.m. Friday, July 23, on the University of Kentucky campus near Commonwealth Stadium.

Thus far, softball is the team sport with the largest registration, 355 teams representing 6,680 players. Soccer is second with 278 teams, or a total of 3,044 players. Registrations for other team sports include basketball, 131 teams (665 players); volleyball, 60 teams (480 players); tee-ball, 24 teams (360 players); and flag football, 14 teams (112 players).

Other individual sports and the current number of registrants are: 45; bowling, 70; chess, 35; archery, 42; wrestling, 38; and 3K road race, 66.

Sports that will be taking additional registrations on site only are swimming and wrestling (July 16 at weigh-in). Sports that will accept additional entries at opening ceremonies only are track and field, bowling and chess.

Sports that will be taking additional registrations both at opening ceremonies and on-site are: archery, disc golf, horseback, martial arts, Western horse show, shooting and tennis.

Last year, more than 19,000 amateur athletes participated in the Summer Games.

Entry information and forms can be obtained by logging on to the Bluegrass State Games web site at www.bbsp.org. Booklets can also be picked up at Valleyline Instant Oil Change locations in Louisville and Northern Kentucky; McDonald's Restaurants in Central and Southeastern Kentucky; Major Street; GTE Phone; Major Wireless Kiosks; local Parks and Recreation Department in each county; and public libraries throughout the state.

Members of the Bluegrass State Games are a project of the Governor's Commission on Sports, Physical Activity, and Wellness. They are aimed at providing Kentuckians of all abilities and ages an opportunity to participate in a statewide family sports festival.
