The smell of fresh bread! We all enjoy going to the grocery store and passing the deli and bakery departments. With today's busy life style this is as close as most of us get to fresh baked bread today.

Back in 1892 Carlisle was greeted to its first bakery, Carlisle Bakery and Confectionery which was operated by Frederick Grater. His brother soon joined him in the family business and it gradually increased.

Skilled bakers were hired from the Baker's Home in Cincinnati. They mostly baked 200 or more loaves of

White House declares flood disaster for Nicholas County

In a response to his request for federal assistance, Governor Paul Patton announced Monday night that President Clinton has declared portion of north central and north eastern Kentucky as federal disaster areas following torrential rains and flooding which occurred on February 18 and 19.

Nicholas County is among the nine counties to receive aid," said Mark Hughes who serves as Nicholas County Fire Chief and Emergency Management Director.

Nicholas County Judge-Executive Larry Tinscher told The Carlisle Mercury this

week that many people from the state and federal level, along with local officials and residents have worked very hard this week to determine the amount of damage to Nicholas County. "Without a joint effort, a quick response would not have been possible and it could have held up any and that is coming our way."

"President Clinton told me the assistance made available by the declaration will provide help for individuals and families as well as for local governments and utilities affected by the storms," Governor Patton

Eaglestone Farm listed in 2000 Report

Eaglestone Farm, Carlisle, Kentucky, owns three bulls listed in the 2000 Spring Sire Evaluation Report published by the American Angus Association which is headquartered in St. Joseph, Missouri. Issued in both the spring and fall, the performance information available on 4,720 sires.

The American Angus Association has the most complete and comprehensive cattle database in the world," says John Crouch, American Angus Association director of performance programs. "Of the sires listed in the main report, 82 percent have expected progeny differences (EPD's) for carcass

traits, which should assist cattlemen in choosing genetics that will produce a more consistent higher quality beef product." EPD's are generated from performance data submitted by breeders through the Angus Herd Improvement Record (AHIR) program.

Traits in which EPD's are available include birth weight, weaning weight, milk, yearling, carcass traits including carcass weight, marbling, rib eye area, external fat thickness and percent retail product. The analysis for the sire evaluation report is done in cooperation with the State University, by Doyle E. Wilson and Dr. Abebe Hassen.

ALS service approved for ambulance

As of 7:00 a.m. Wednesday the Nicholas County Ambulance Service will have an Advanced Life Support unit," said Nicholas County Judge-Executive Larry Tinscher in an interview with The Carlisle Mercury on Tuesday afternoon.

The Fiscal Court requested ALS service almost a year ago when bids were accepted to provide ambulance service to Nicholas County and Carlisle residents.

Michelle Mitchell and Stephanie Ring have been working non stop over the past seven months since they took over the ambulance service to make the ALS a reality.

"Getting medications upgraded to an ALS service

has been one of the most major aspects of trying to obtain the license. Being from a small town, we do not go through the quantity of drugs that larger cities use," said King.

One of the advantages to having an ALS unit is that in life threatening situations the paramedics may administer IV's and special medications. They may incubate the patient or use a fibrillator which monitors the heart's rhythm.

"Under the direction of Dr. Ann Rinaldi, who serves as Medical Director for the ambulance service, and the great caring staff, Nicholas County will be receiving the best Health Care in the area," said Mitchell.

Henry Holiday and Joe Hall were porters in the cafeteria. The brick oven used for baking, and fired by wood brought by the cord from the farmer. Big ham sandwiches were sold for 20 cents each. Big squares of Washington pie, made of stale crushed cake, raisins, apple juice and spices were also sold for 10 cents each.

In 1914 the grocery and bakery went to John H. Wood for several years. Mr. and Mrs. Simon Go to he opened the grocery for several years. Mrs. Wallace Ledford was clerk.

Then the bakers and restaurant were sold to Joe Pelosi, who operated it for some time, then James Vice rented, and stayed for some time. Later R.W. Neal bought the baker and lunch room. He retained the same baker, Mike Ritter. Mrs. Maud Shannon was the able clerk. Mrs. Neal was a big help.

During the big Court Day held the first Monday of every month Worth Sapp was Mr. Neal's partner and all kinds of bakery goods to the smaller towns, and the smaller bakeries were abandoned.
