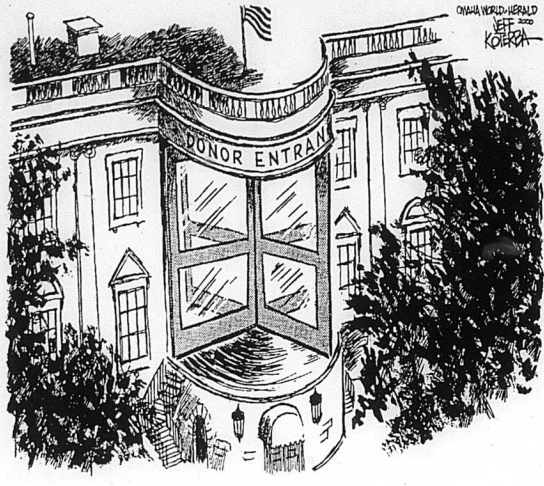

Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor:

What is worse, and adult who allows a child to ride in a vehicle unrestrained, or an adult who drives children while intoxicated? As far as the Kentucky State Police is concerned, these drivers are both equally of needless putting children in danger. And during the nationwide crackdown known as Operation ABC Mobilization, our officers will be stepping up efforts to look for both kinds of offenders.

For the first time in history, more than 8,000 law enforcement agencies nationwide will mobilize this Thanksgiving week, from November 20-26, in a

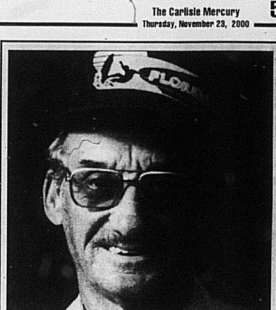
