The senior citizens will have their annual Chili Dinner Saturday, Dec. 2, beginning at 11 a.m. that morning...

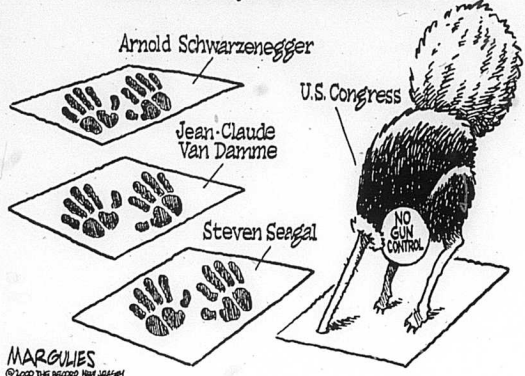
While we all wonder and worry about how expensive Christmas is, I would like to remind everyone who still has Christmas in all about...

Let's take the next several weeks instead of dwelling over the bad things that come along with everyday life to try and be thankful for the good things we have...

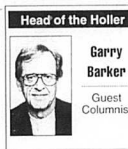

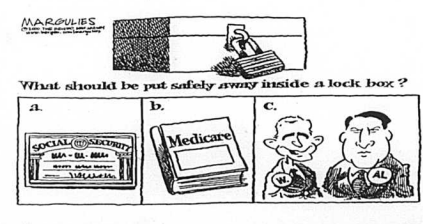
Here it is, I write, the first of November, and so far I've only heard Christmas music in one store. I do have a sore back from carrying out all the mail order catalogs we've received...

Four certain tracts or parcels of land located in Nicholas County, Kentucky and bounded and described as follows:

First Tract: A certain tract or parcel of land, lying in Nicholas County, Kentucky, on the waters of Big Branch and bounded and abutted as follows to:
