I believe these acts are wrong and inconsiderate and we should take the consequences in to consideration before we tell what we don't know to be of fact.

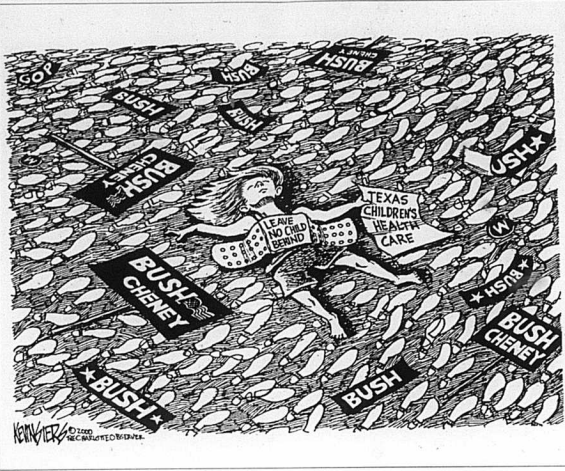
So my final two cents..... For what it's worth.... Just remember the old saying. Believe nothing you hear and only half of what you see.

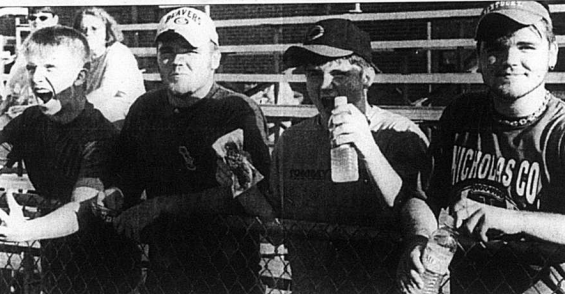
its volunteers, I ask you to help give today's youngsters a home and a future. Be a Boy's Haven supporter. Send your contribution today.

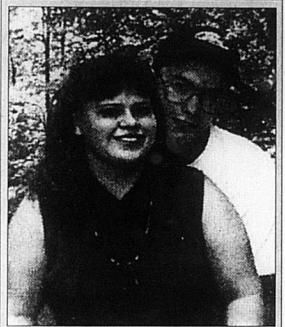
