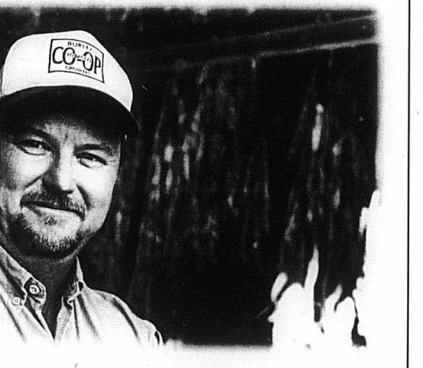
Veteran's Rep to be at courthouse

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NOTICE TO CUSTOMERS OF KENTUCKY UTILITIES COMPANY
AVOIDED ENVIRONMENTAL SURCHARGE TARIF
PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that on October 20, 2000, Kentucky Utilities Company ("KUC") will file with the Kentucky Public Service Commission ("Commission") Case No. 2000-439, an Application pursuant to Kentucky Revised Statutes 78.183 for approval of an avoided environmental surcharge tariff to be applied to the rates for electric service provided through KUC's environmental surcharge. The total cost of these new facilities is estimated to be \$1.29 per month per KUC customer.
The Federal Clean Air Act continues to impose new and additional requirements on KUC and other electric utilities. The United States Environmental Protection Agency has promulgated a series of regulations that require certain utilities, like KUC, to reduce certain "NOX" emissions to a level of 0.15 lbs. NOx/MWh by May 1, 2003. KUC will need to invest in additional projects to reduce those emissions at its Grant, Brown, Green River, Pineville and Tipton generating stations in order to comply with these and additional environmental requirements.
KUC is also asking the Commission to approve proposed changes to its Electric Rate Schedule, ES, effective for customer bills rendered on and after May 1, 2001. The proposed changes, associated with the avoided environmental surcharge, will include changes in the Environmental Fees associated with the pollution control projects approved by the Commission in 1998 and included in Case No. 93-465 for cost recovery.
KUC is also requesting that an overall rate of return that includes a return on equity of 11.5 percent be used in the calculation of the environmental surcharge to reduce the cost burden and associated with the avoided environmental surcharge to reduce the cost burden and associated with the avoided environmental surcharge.
Any corporation, association, body politic or person may, by motion within thirty (30) days after publication of this notice, request a hearing on the proposed environmental surcharge schedule. W.B. Griffin 1904-2000

W.B. Griffin of Lexington, son of Henry Thomas Griffin (deceased) and Laura Ritchie Griffin (deceased) of Carlisle, Kentucky. He was preceded in death by his first wife, Gladys Bobb Griffin, and a sister, Gladys McWhorter and Andrew McWhorter.
He was born on August 25, 1904 in Carlisle, Kentucky and entered the insurance business in 1925 as a special agent for American Bankers Insurance Company in Cincinnati, Ohio. He was transferred to Detroit, Michigan in 1927 as Assistant Manager and to Akron, Ohio as Manager in 1928. In 1929 he was transferred to Lexington, Kentucky as Lexington Supervisor. He established his own insurance agency in Lexington in 1933, his agency became one of the largest special risk agencies in Kentucky, providing group insurance programs to members of professional associations and trade groups.
He retired in 1975 after serving 50 years as the senior partner of W.B. Griffin & Son, Insurance Administration, and remained active in an advisory capacity until his death.
He had been a Mason since 1925 and received a gold pin signifying 60 years continuous membership. Membership included Lexington Lodge #1 F & M, Lexington Chapter #1 R.A.M., Washington Council #R.S.M., Webb Commandery #1 K.T. and Oleika Shrine Temple. There was a Masonic Service held.
He was a well-known collector of circus memorabilia and most of his circus and music collections were donated to the University of Kentucky's King Library and to the Circus World Museum in Baraboo, Wisconsin. He was also a member of Windjammers Unlimited and a member of the Shrine Band for 25 years as a trombonist. He had served as treasurer of the Lexington Local of the American Federation of Musicians. He was a member of the First United Methodist Church in Lexington.
Survivors include a sister, Halley Frances Griffin and wife, Joyce LaCasse Griffin, Cincinnati, Ohio; two grandsons, John T. Griffin, Jr., Nicholasville, KY and William F. Marvin L. "Pete" Worthington 1940-2000

Marvin L. "Pete" Worthington was born in Maysville, Kentucky on December 5, 1940, the oldest son of Marvin L. "Buster" and Maude Graham Worthington. All of his life he lived in the Ewing community in western Fleming County. Pete attended Ewing Elementary and Fleming County High School (1958). He attended Morehead State University and earned a B.S. degree from the University of Kentucky (1965) in mechanical engineering. After graduating from UK, Pete accepted a position with IBM as a mechanical engineer in Lexington, Kentucky. His life style in his hometown of Ewing, Pete decided to commute more than a hundred miles daily, rather than move. This enabled him to continue farming and raising tobacco. He was a lifelong loyal "Yellow Dog Democrat."
Pete and his former wife, the late Linda Powers Worthington, had three children, two daughters, Laura Harris of Glasgow, and Dr. Julie Worthington of Tampa, Florida and a son Weston Worthington of Mayaville, Kentucky. Two grandchildren, Steady and Henry Harris of Glasgow. Always a leader, Pete was involved in his community. He was a member of the Ewing Baptist Church, Favorite Lodge 581 F & A M and the Ewing Volunteer Fire Department. He served as a precinct worker for the Fleming County Democrat Party. In 1974, Pete made his first bid for public office and was elected to the Fleming County Board of Education. In the summer of 1976 a propane

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gas explosion leveled the Ewing Volunteer Fire Department. This small farming community could not afford to rebuild and purchase new equipment. Working with Governor Julian Carr and Senator Walter "Doc" Hudlett, Pete became involved in the state government. He was the first to fund a dogged determination house, a new fire house soon rose from the rubble.
In 1977, Pete decided to seek an open seat at the Kentucky General Assembly representing Fleming, Mason and Robertson Counties. The district also included a portion of Rowan County. It was a widely accepted political view that he could not win. But the underdog worked hard and smart. He ran on a pledge that he would not "promise work". Some political promises are forgotten after the election, but Pete's wife's shining example of a promise

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shooked the day mayers with a stunning victory. His intellect and savvy political skills were readily apparent. He was a stickler for detail. Pete quickly delivered public funding and policy victories for his district. These successes enabled Pete to be re-elected a remarkable ten times without opposition. During his twenty-three year tenure in the Kentucky House of Representatives, he mastered the budgeting process. He also became a force advocate for the needs of his constituents. Pete served as Speaker Pro Tem from 1983 to 1992. His colleagues in the House in both political parties sought and valued his advance and counsel. At the time of his death, he was serving as Chairman of the influential budget subcommittee on transportation. Just three days before his death, he presided over the dedication of a new \$37 million bridge spanning the Ohio River from
