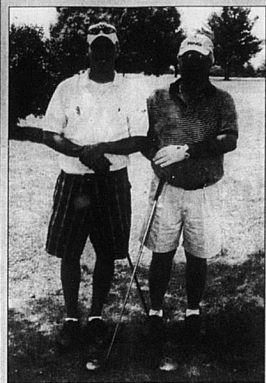
## Library storytime slated
