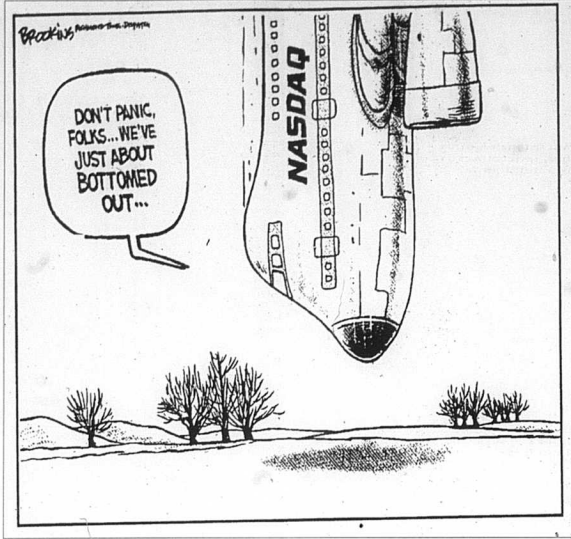
I heard a couple from Winchester turned right around and went back home after learning of the parking price.
