AAA expects drop in Christmas travel

This Christmas-New Year's holiday, 51.7 million Americans will travel 50 miles or more from home, a 6 percent decline over last year's 57.1 million people.

AAA projects that 42.2 million travelers will go by motor vehicle this holiday, a drop of only 1 percent from the 42.7 million who took a trip last year. Another 11.5 million will travel by plane, train or bus, down 20 percent from the 14.4 million who traveled last Christmas.

"The recession and the nation's unemployment situation are two reasons for the expected drop in holiday travel, although continued concerns about air travel security by some Americans also are a factor," said Dan Dickson, Public Relations Manager at AAA.

Spurred in part by gas prices that have fallen to their lowest level since March 1999, 79 percent of those traveling this holiday will go by auto compared to 75 percent one year ago. The statistic will have the greatest numbers of auto travelers, with 11.4 million.

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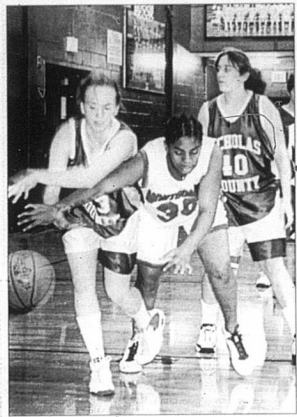
