Universal has once again made the mistake of marketing the 'Jurassic Park franchise and this time, they came with a really scary batch.

Jurassic Park III (PG-13, Universal) flip-flopped from being a semi-suspension action-adventure to being 'The Parent Trap.' Only this time I want two random-looking twins reuniting two divorced parents, it was an island of genetically-engineered dinosaurs.

Some difference: I had really high hopes for this movie, when I found out that Sam Neill (Dr. Alan Grant) returned to the fold. *Jurassic Park* veteran Laura Dern even made a cameo. I thought it was going to be a great movie.

Don't get me wrong, the movie has a lot of good ideas and presents a advance in paleontology with the design and choice of new dinosaurs, but it's a lost cause as it struts together without much thought and with poor editing.

The action scenes end too abruptly and are way too short anyway - just like the movie.
