produced by Kentucky farmers totaled 243.0 million pounds. This was down 36 percent from the 1999 crop and the smallest crop since 1942. The smaller crop resulted from a decrease in harvested acreage. Harvest acreage was down due to reductions in the basic and effective quota. The quotas regulate the pounds of tobacco that a farmer can sell. Yield per acre at 2,025 pounds up 215 pounds.

Bourbon top burley producing county

Bourbon County was the number one Kentucky burley county in 2000 producing 7.91 million pounds according to the Kentucky Agricultural Statistics Service. Bourbon County replaced Barren as the leading production county. Prior to 2000, Barren had been the leading county in recent years. Fayette ranked second with 7.2 million pounds followed by Madison, Barren and Shelby counties. Twenty-six counties had production in excess of 3.50 million pounds. For 1999, 48 counties had production of 3.50 million pounds and more.
