CITY from 1 capital. "It's hard for any small community to retain police officers and other employees who have to be certified," he continued. "Bigger cities can give a couple of dollars on the hour."

"But here, employees have to lose where they are or we're going to lose them. It's hard," Clark said. "We have a few occasions when he has put his maintenance clothes on to help the city plant and get someone out of town. I have to pitch in with wild pipes and things," Clark said.

"As far as long-range plans, the city is limited, Clark said. "We have a water plant under scrutiny because we can't meet state guidelines," he continued. "Being economically distressed means we have to look at other ways of getting revenue, and the council has authorized me to look at other economic development funds, state surplus funds and we hope to have special lobbying done in Washington to get a new water plant and to get someone to take over the capacity of sewer."

The water plant is running at 90 percent capacity and the wastewater treatment plant is running at 80 percent capacity, he said. "It's hard to attract industry and housing when you have an economic hardship," Clark said. "As far as I'm concerned, they're in the city and entitled to what they are getting, but we're not receiving back what the city is entitled to," Clark said.

"We're still hung up on that," Clark said. "The city and I are doing everything we can to do it, but it's not being paid to the city, and the school system is withholding payroll tax from its employees, but that money is not being paid to the city, and the school system is also withholding the 1 percent occupational tax from the city."

Clark said he plans to ask the school board to suspend the amount the board has spent on opposition to annexation and where those funds came from.

Immunization requirements change for children

Two recent changes in Kentucky's school immunization requirements will help prevent the spread of disease among children, the Department for Public Health announced today.

Beginning Aug. 1 of 2001, all children who are at least 19 months old and less than seven years old and who attend day care centers, certified family child homes, preschools and public and private schools will be required to have one dose of the varicella vaccine to prevent chickenpox.

The vaccine will not be required if a parent, guardian or physician states that the child has had the disease chickenpox.
