try or 100 - but first those long-range shots had to be fired. And after the break they did.

A cranked up defense helped Storie's bunch get better looks at the start of the third. Darrin Herrington took Ryan Bretz's steal and laid it off the glass at 7:44 starting the assault on the Bath County lead. A series of baskets of defensive rebounds or steals pulled the scrappy Jackets to within three 24-21 at 3:03 - or just when the hosting Gate should have taken them away.

"They just out-hustled us and that's the bottom line," first-year Bath County coach John Baber said after the game. "We didn't perform defensively in that second half like we did in the first, and we just missed too many easy shots."

He was preceded in death by a son, Billy Hopkins and a brother, Alva Hopkins.

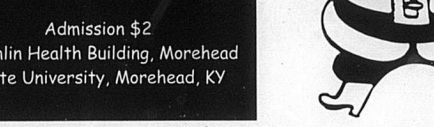
