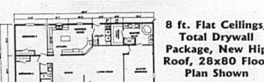

House plans for Senate redistricting and asked the House to abject by a tradition in which each chamber rubberstamped the other's proposals. Democrats in the House decided to break with that tradition this year in retaliation for the rejection of two Democratic senators whose party switches gave the Republicans control of the Senate. The House sent the bill back to the Senate, asking them to recede their revisions. The Senate refused and asked for a conference committee in which delegates from each chamber met. Senate Republican leaders again asked House Democratic leaders for a rubberstamp compromise, but were denied. Finally, Senate Republican leaders declined an invitation from House delegates to meet in a free conference committee, which would have allowed both parties to craft a compromise plan.

The courts can decide," said Senate President David Williams, R-Burkesville, after adjourning the session. "We (the House and Senate) are at an impasse. The House passed House Bill 1 on Jan. 23 after two hours of passionate speeches on the House floor from Democrats and Republicans. Republicans resisted Democrats for breaking with the tradition of chambers approving one another's redistricting plans, while touting Republican cooperation with the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, or NAACP, in crafting a House redistricting plan

Democrats' redistricting plan. Earlier in the day on Jan. 25, the Senate passed a redistricting bill for U.S. Congressional districts. Senate Bill 65, sponsored by Sen. Tom Buford, R-Nicholasville, began as a nepotism bill that proposed allowing relatives of school board members to be employed in the same school system. That language was stripped so that Republicans could win favor over two weeks of congressional redistricting plan into a bill that, according to procedural rules, was ready to be sent to the House. A House bill proposing U.S. House redistricting has been sitting on the House floor for over two weeks. A vote has not been made on it.

New therapy to benefit stroke patients

Individuals who have lost use of their arms or legs due to a stroke or injury to their brain can now benefit from a new rehabilitation program called Modified Constraint-Induced Therapy. Beginning January 2002, Cardinal Hill Rehabilitation Hospital will be providing four-week therapy programs through their Center for Outpatient Services.

Modified C-I therapy involves restricting patient's unaffected or strong limb by covering it with a mitt or plastic. It is a slight physical and occupational induced therapy program. The traditional program requires a patient to attend therapy six hours a day, five

specifically, each activity requires a patient to push, pull and reach for items with their weakened limb. The supervised program lasts five hours a day, three days a week with a one-hour lunch and necessary rest breaks. Studies on modified constraint-induced therapy show that patients involved in this type of program are regaining the use of their affected limbs. Cardinal Hill's modified program is slightly different than the traditional constraint induced therapy program. Help for financial aid forms offered

Students and parents can get free help filling out the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA), the form required for state and federal financial aid programs, at College Goal Sunday. The event will be held Sunday, Feb. 10, at 17 sites in 15 cities across Kentucky. People planning to attend should arrive by 2 p.m. local time. All sessions will end at 4 p.m.

College Goal Sunday is sponsored by the Kentucky Association of Student Financial Aid Administrators in cooperation with the Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority (KHEAA). KHEAA is the state agency that administers state scholarship, work-study, savings and Federal Family Education Loan Programs (FFELP) to help students pay for college or technical training.

Families attending College Goal Sunday will bring their completed 2001 IRS 1040 tax return and any other 2001 income and benefits information. If families have not yet completed their taxes, they should bring all the information needed for filling out their tax forms. Financial aid professionals will help them use that information to complete the FAFSA. They will not help families fill out tax forms.
