

A Paris man was found dead in a Nicholas County pond early Tuesday morning, according to police. Officials said Clay Bertz, 25, of Paris, was

found face down in a farm pond, located at 848 Snodgrass Road after a night of fishing and frog-gigging.



Bertz was at the pond camping with three others and was last seen alive around 4 a.m. When the other campers awoke, they found Bertz in the pond, police said.
