Educate your children about sexual abuse. Unless you are clinically trained and given the opportunity for diagnostic assessment, it is unlikely that you can identify a child sexual abuser. She usually does not suffer from pathological mental illness. She is likely to engage in ordinary work or social activities, and she appears normal.

It is difficult to "avoid" a child sexual abuser. Even the most cautious and vigilant of parents cannot, nor would they want to, keep a 24-hour watch on their child. Besides,

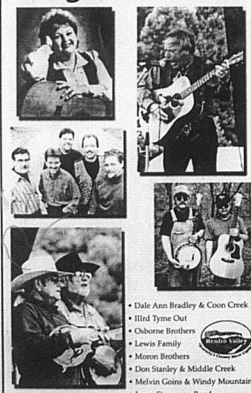
the adult who is prone to sexually abuse children often chooses work or activities which bring him/her into contact with the children. The best line of defense against sexual abuse is education. The second is communication. Parents are primary teachers of children and are responsible for showing them how to survive and how to cope with life. The first thing parents can do to protect their children is to teach them to protect themselves by communicating their fears and by talking about their daily activities.

NICHOLAS COUNTY WATER DISTRICT 2001 QUALITY WATER REPORT

We are very pleased to provide you with this "Quality Water Report." We want to keep you informed about the quality of our water and services we have delivered to you over the past year. Our goal is to always have the best water, a safe and dependable supply of drinking water. We want you to understand the efforts we make continuously to improve and protect our water resources. We are committed to ensuring the quality of your water remains at the highest level and at a competitive price as we meet the needs of our community.

Our water supply presently comes from the Licking River through two separate sources. The City of Carlisle pumps water from this river to this lake before treatment. Western Farming treats water directly from Licking River and it is transported through Buffalo Trail Water Association to us, and our newest source, the City of Millersburg, treats water from the Irrigation Canal. The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and in some cases radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the activities of man or industry. Contaminants that may be present in source water include microbial contaminants, organic contaminants, pesticides and herbicides, organic chemical contaminants, and radioactive contaminants.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. We enforce these regulations to the best of our ability. If you want to learn more, please contact us anytime prior to any of our regularly scheduled board meetings. They are normally held on the second Tuesday of each month at 6:30 p.m. at our office at 1639 Old Paris Rd., Carlisle, Ky.

As many of you already know, we are now building at 1639 Old Paris Road, Carlisle, KY. We now have a drive thru window as well as a night drop box for your payments. The new building stands at the junction of HWY 32 and US 69. It is located beside our maintenance building.

We are currently at the end of our Phase V, Phase VI and Phase VII Projects, which

The MCL for TTHM's will change to 80 in the year 2002. Unregulated contaminants are those for which EPA has not established drinking water standards. Their purpose of unregulated contaminant monitoring is to assist EPA in determining the occurrence of unregulated contaminants in drinking water and whether future regulation is warranted.
