GETAWAY FROM FRONT- and skiing, the lake draws thousands each year. And with breath-taking beauty, just lakes or hike rides can be worth the trip to the green hills and crystal-clear waters of the region.

Pine Tree offers fully-stocked cabins for nightly or extended stay. And the Thomas's are about to unveil the jewel of their business: the honeymoon cabin. A skylight brings moonlight (or sunshine) into the soon-to-be opened cabin. And a jazz of the living room is sure to be a hot item.

"Very much so," the proud grandmother said when her young granddaughter hunted for crawdads, or snakes, or minnows in the creek that winds through her property.

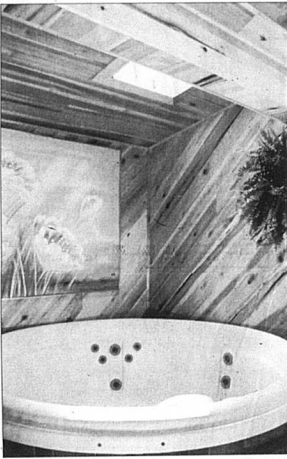
"This falls on the way down from Springfield, Ohio and he and his family have been coming down for eight straight years.

The Mountain Muskie Lodge is just around the

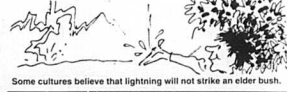

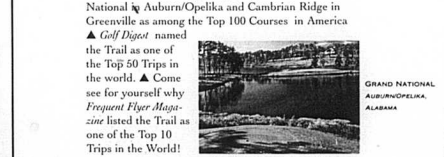
