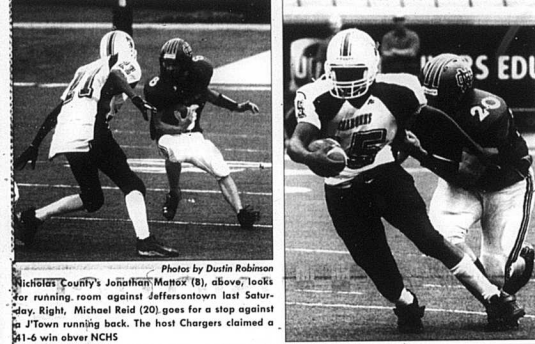
SPORTS J'Town proves a tough opener
