In his hand he held a crumpled and dirty sheet of paper, which he occasionally looked at when he wasn't busy wiping the tears from his eyes.

Company 1 of the 4th Kentucky Infantry Regiment. This unit was a Confederate unit of the same name as his very own Union unit.

At first he merely glanced at the writing, but he found that he could not take his gaze from the paper, and he studied it closely in the small glow near the fire.

Both had been too terribly long and bitter years ago. With permission from his commanders, Aas had told Union soldiers on the front lines to question Confederate pickets, along their own front lines, about his brother's unit.

The pickets of both armies were scattered along with his protective cover and began walking toward the Confederate lines, oblivious to the shouts of concern from his own men.
