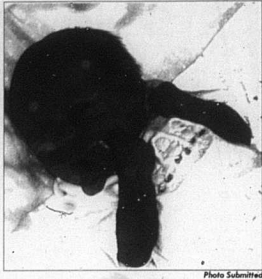

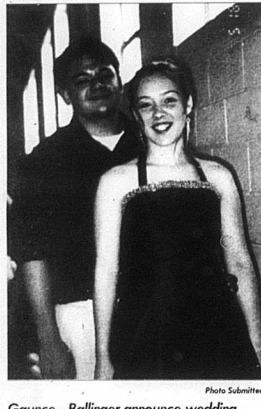

Continued from Page 1. 6-0 enabling Mayor Clark to pursue a \$250,000 grant for a two phase project. The city's in-kind contribution would be to tear up the sidewalks and haul them off. The project is approved. Jefferson, who is also City Fire Chief, told council members the 1967 fire truck the city has in service does not meet pumping standards. The mayor sought to declare an emergency, however Carlisle City Attorney Skip Watson said he could not support it being declared an emergency.

Mayor Clark said he would solicit bids and work to replace the old truck at the next meeting. The mayor sought to replace it with funds in the emergency fund as a down payment with sufficient monies to pay off the outstanding loans for fire vehicles. Council is expected to act on it next month. Council approved seeking bids for engineers should the city receive a \$500,000 grant.

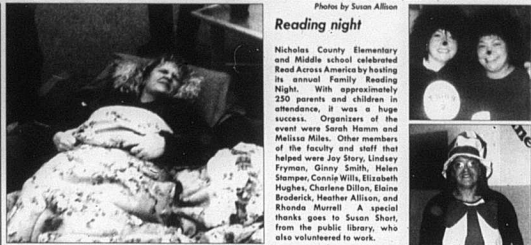

Carlisle Police Report released

City of Carlisle Police Chief William D. Denton has released the month's activities for the Carlisle Police Department cover the month of February 2007. Officers of the department 2, contempt of court 2, pre-prepared four accident reports. In total, the department shows 31 arrests broken down in the following manner: alcohol intoxication 1, assault 2, burglary 1, carrying concealed deadly weapon 1, criminal mischief 1, criminal trespassing 1, disorderly conduct 1, drug related 8, DUI arrests 3, menacing 1, public intoxication 2, resisting arrest 3, shoplifting 1, traffic related 7, unlawful transaction with a minor 1. There were 11 warrants served: 3 failure to appear, failure to pay child support 2, contempt of court 2, pre-prepared four accident reports. The chief's monthly report shows 174 calls for service broken down in this manner: city crew 9, coroner 1, county crew 5, emergency management 4, EMS 32, fire 9, police 104, state crew 5, and utilities 2. The officers of the department opened 7 new cases. There were three cases closed. The officers issued 57 citations.
