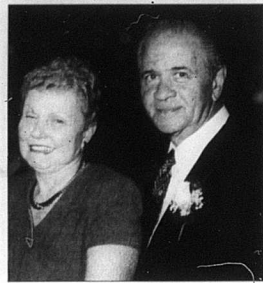


Anniversary

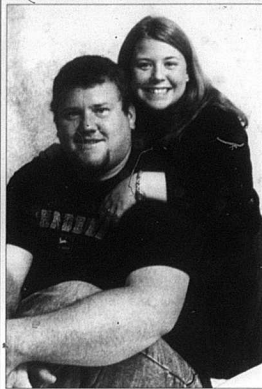
Award winners

NOTICE OF VIOLATION
Nicholas County Water District purchases water from four different sources. One of the products of water for Nicholas County Water District's customers is the City of Marlinton. The information being published here is for informational purposes only. We routinely monitor for the presence of drinking water contaminants. Testing methods we use are based on the MCLs for each contaminant. The standard for maximum contaminant level (MCL) for disinfection byproduct haloacetic acids (HAA5) is 0.060 mg/L. The average level of HAA5 over the last year was 0.034 mg/L.
What Should I do?
You do not need to use an alternative (e.g. bottled) water supply. However, if you have specific health concerns, consult your doctor.
What Does This Mean?
This is not an immediate risk. If it had been, you would have been notified immediately.
Some people who drink water containing haloacetic acids in excess of the MCL over many years may face an increased risk of getting cancer.
Total organic carbon (TOC) has no health effects. However, total organic carbon provides a medium for the formation of disinfection byproducts. The by-product includes haloacetic acids (HAA5). Drinking water containing these byproducts in excess of the MCL may lead to adverse health effects, liver or kidney problems, or increased risk of getting cancer.
What is being done?
We are working with the Division of Water to evaluate the water supply and researching options to correct the problem.

Current or former workers at The Portsmouth Gaseous Diffusion Plant

If you are a current (or former) worker employed at the Portsmouth Gaseous Diffusion Plant, and have or had an illness that may have resulted from exposure to toxic substances, you may be eligible for compensation and medical benefits from the U.S. Department of Labor's Energy Employees Occupational Illness Compensation Program. Survivors of workers who died from these illnesses may also be eligible for a compensation benefit. As of July 2007, the U.S. Department of Labor has paid out over \$2 BILLION in compensation and more than \$100 million in medical benefits to claimants nationwide.
