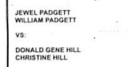

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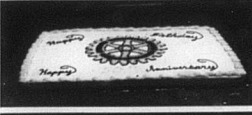

Kentucky Farm Bureau promoting food check-out week February 3-9

America's food is the most nutritious, wholesome, and most affordable in the world. This fact is true because of the tremendous production and efficiency of the American farmer.
Each year the American Farm Bureau leads a national campaign to encourage the use of the day or week on the calendar when the average American family will have earned enough income to pay for the entire year's food supply. Because American consumers spend only 10.9 percent of their disposable income for their food, they will have earned this income in the first 57 days (5 weeks) of the year, according to the United States Department of Agriculture.
According to the Tax Foundation, Americans must work 52 days each year to pay for health and medical care, 62 days to pay for housing, household operation and 77 days to pay their federal taxes for the entire year. In other countries spend much more of their disposable income on food: Japan-14 percent, Germany-15 percent, France-16 percent, Philippines-38 percent, Indonesia-55 percent.
"Not only is America's food supply the world's safest, but it is also the most affordable," said Marshall Coyle, Kentucky Farm Bureau president. "The safe, abundant, and affordable domestic food supply that is produced by America's farmers is responsible, at least in part, for our nation's increasing standard of living. Coyle stated: There are 2.13 million farms dotting America's rural landscape. More than 21 million American workers (16 percent of the U.S. workforce) produce, process and sell the nation's food and fiber."
